 - #2 Chariots bog down and lose wheels, horses can get outrun.

 Josh. 11:4-5, 6-9 Northern Canaanite kings.

 Judg. 4:11-16 Hazor and Sisera.

SOME TRUST IN CHARIOTS

Why put trust in the Lord?

#1 – God always wins.

Cannot be overpowered – Isa. 40:10, 12

Cannot be outsmarted – Isa. 40:13-14, 28

Cannot be outlasted – Isa. 40:28

Nothing compares to Him – Isa. 40:18, 25

Nations are nothing to Him – Isa. 40:15, 17, 22

Can never be beaten – Isa. 40:23; Job 12:14-25

Why put trust in the Lord?

#2 – When God wins, His faithful people win with Him.

God's promise: certain victory – Isa. 41:10-13.

Faith's guaranteed victory over tribulation, distress, persecution, famine, nakedness, peril, or sword – Rom. 8:31-39.

Faith will always be the victory that overcomes the world – 1 John 5:4.

SOME TRUST IN CHARIOTS

The THEREFORE of all of this: 1 Tim. 6:17

Direct application: Riches.

Have them, do good with them (vs. 18), but never trust in them. Trust in God.

Greater principle: Anything but God.

"Command those who are _____ in this present age not to be haughty, nor to trust in uncertain _____, but in the living God."
